
REDUCE REUSE RECYCLE

Dispose of your e-waste properly



The <u>Basel Action Network</u> has certified recyclers who responsibly and ethically dispose of electronic waste.

Specifically, that means recyclers certified as e-Stewards by the Basel Action Network (BAN), a global toxics trade watchdog group named after the U.N. Basel Convention.

To be certified, recyclers must demonstrate that no hazardous e-waste will be exported to developing countries, deposited in landfills or incinerators, or sent to prison labor operations. The recyclers also erase all data from storage components. E-Stewards is considered the most rigorous standard in the United States.
